

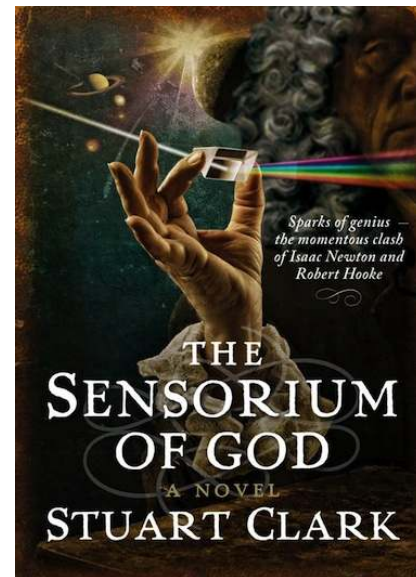
Isaac Newton and the Sensorium of God
